STUDENT NURSE AND WOMEN'S RIGHTS ADVOCATE ROSA COJ BOCEL



Our May program meeting featured a video on the work of the Mayan Families NGO in Guatemala and a personal presentation by Rosa Coj Bocel, a young Mayan woman who has become a voice for women's rights and a force for community development.

As a workshop educator, she combats misconceptions about women's health and promotes health services such as cervical cancer screening. Although she had to drop out of school to support her family when she was in the sixth grade, Rosa persevered to overcome abject poverty and personal hardship to pursue her education—she is the first person in her community to attend university.

She is now in her third year of nursing school and hopes to open a clinic in her community when she finishes.

Rosa has starred in the documentary films *Living on One Dollar* and *Rosa—These Storms*, and has been profiled by NPR on its list of "Women Changing the World."

FFSB members at the program meeting added stories of their own work with Mayan Families on community improvement projects like installing stoves, water heaters, and, most recently, solar lights, and in assisting at schools, helping distribute food, and participating in construction projects.

on the journey you are interested in, and then click on the "View Details". A box pops up when you
pause on the picture of the Journey.

2. The quarterly newsletter, ENEWSLETTER, reports on recent events such as the 2018 Festival at Sea,
important upcoming events such as the 2019 World Conference in Boulder, Colorado (July 23-27), and
clubs featured for their special achievements.

3. Highlights from the annual FFI Board of Directors meeting, held in March, include:

- Development of a global satisfaction survey to gauge the strengths and weaknesses of FFI
from year to year.
- A report on the financial status of FFI showing that the organization finished the year ahead of
budget.

To conform to this new law, FFI has updated its Privacy Policy and processes for managing data. This will make organization of the policy clearer and will better explain FFI's relationship with members. **Friendship Force Western Super-Regional
Conference:
Citizens of a Global Community**

Last May, I attended the Western Super Regional conference in Sacramento, themed "Citizens of a Global Community," and have been asked to report on some of the information I learned. One of the keynote presentations was Joy Justus, director of World Relief of Sacramento, and a panel of refugees who have been helped through that organization. The goal of World Relief is to help refugees and immigrants obtain employment and become self-sufficient. Since 1989 they have welcomed more than 30,000 refugees and immigrants, and in 2017 resettled 1,800 people, a 61% increase since 2005.

Since World War II, 65 million men, women, and children have been forcibly displaced because of persecution or war in their home countries. Out of 22 million, only 75,000 received U.S. visas. By 2019 the United States will have granted only 20,000 visas of the 120,000 that were supposed to be available! Even those refugees who worked for the U.S. Armed Forces in their struggles against the regimes in Iraq and Afghanistan and obtained "Special Immigrant Visas" have not been allowed to enter the U.S. as they had been promised.

Sacramento, because of the work by World Relief and other organizations, is now the largest refugee center in the U.S. World Relief has partnered with churches and volunteers to provide housing, basic necessities, language assistance, health screenings, school registration, and other needs.

Sacramento World Relief believes that "A garden is not a garden with just one flower; a true garden has a myriad of flowers and other plants growing and flourishing in it." In the same manner, our country can grow and flourish with many types of people and religions. One final thought to remember: Out of 3 million refugees, not one life has ever been taken by a refugee!
