FFSB Exchange to Madison, Wisconsin

Following the FFSB Exchange to Minnesota, ten ambassadors continued on to Madison Wisconsin where we enjoyed a joint exchange with the FF club from Winnipeg, Canada (10/13 – 10/20, 2016). This exchange included a number of unique experiences including a visit at the International Crane Foundation whose mission is to conserve cranes and their habitat. The Crane Foundation is the only place in the world where there is a complete collection of the 15 species of cranes. The Foundation was started in the early 1970s by two graduate students who were concerned that the population of many species of cranes was diminishing.



After lunch we headed into the Wisconsin Dells and a boat tour of the Upper Wisconsin River. It was a beautiful day and the ride and stops on the river were fantastic. This photo is of the famous Stand Rock, the most legendary of all the

Dells rock formations. Note the photo of the dog jumping between the rocks, taken by our host, Tom Miller! That evening we enjoyed small dinner parties at member's homes. Because this was a joint exchange with Winnipeg, it gave us an opportunity to socialize with ambassadors from Winnipeg as well as members of the Madison club.

The next day focused on agriculture of the region. We toured ABS - a worldwide leader in artificial insemination of livestock that began in 1941.



In the laboratory, we saw the processes for evaluating and preserving bull semen for worldwide distribution. In the barn we watched the collection process. For many of us, this was our first exposure to artificial breeding which we learned allows farmers to improve the quality and quantity of both meat and milk. Then we continued to a family owned dairy farm with 120 milking cows. Several ambassadors also tried their hand at milking a cow! After a hayride around the farm we had a chance to see young calves and the small animals – sheep, goats, ducks, and chickens. From there we visited the home of a member who is a "horse whisperer" – she trains horses using eye contact and hand signals.

Day three included a tour of two major buildings on the University of Wisconsin campus. The Discovery Center is a modern architectural facility where collaboration between several disciplines is fostered. The building itself is designed in a way that focuses on sustainability – utilizing natural light, living plants and renewable energy. We also toured the UW Atmospheric, Oceanic and Space Sciences building – a screen on a large globe was used to show us weather patterns and ocean currents that are studied there. That afternoon, we toured the First Unitarian Society – a building designed by Frank Lloyd Wright; now a national historic landmark. This was followed by a trip to Capital Brewery with dinner and entertainment at the brewery. Our host slipped in a brief stop at the National Mustard Museum on the way to the brewery – where we sampled many varieties of mustard. They even had a vending machine from which one could purchase mustard!



Saturday began with a visit to a giant-sized Farmers Market that extends around the perimeter of the Wisconsin Capitol (four city blocks). Following lunch we toured the Capitol which is built in a style resembling our National Capitol. The remainder of the afternoon, the group was free; our hosts took us to Monona Terrace – a Frank Lloyd Wright inspired Conference Center that took 50 years to build – because of local politics! The afternoon ended for us, with a walk along State Street and time for a beer on the Terrace of the UW overlooking one of the lakes that is central to that city.

Following a free day on Sunday, we “hit the ground running” again Monday morning with a tour of Pendarvis – a community of immigrants from Cornwall, England who came to the US in the mid-1800s to mine lead. Several of their homes have been preserved by the Wisconsin

Historical Society. After the tour, we were treated to a traditional Cornish “pasty” meal which is a baked pastry filled with meat and vegetables. The “pasty” – which is considered the national dish of Cornwall, was a meal that could easily be carried by the miners into the mines.



The farewell dinner that evening, was an unusual meal with Spaghetti served directly on the tabletops. Tables were covered with a fiberglass board (like a cutting board) and a mound of spaghetti, topped with marinara sauce and meatballs, was poured onto the board. Diners “pulled” some of the spaghetti towards themselves and ate directly from the board! A most unusual experience! After a brief program, the hosts took the Ambassadors home to prepare for their flights the next day. This was a most enjoyable exchange – learning more about our own country while making friends from Madison and Winnipeg, Canada.
